Special Presentation

Gillian Dugas introduced Denise Harris, President of the Etobicoke Historical Society. Denise presented "Then & Now" - pictures, showing the history of Etobicoke. Idyllic farms, small churches, dirt paths and saw mills have been replaced by high rises, overpasses, highways and golf courses.

The Huron Indians lived here in the 1500s, followed by the Iroquois and then the Mississauga Ojibwa band. Etobicoke was first settled by French fur traders and then by the British. The first industry, the King's sawmill was located at the Old Mill Inn site. The Queen's Rangers military men received land grants from the first Lt. Governor, John Graves Simcoe. The population in 1837 was 1,900 and in 1850 the town was registered. At that time 90% of the land was used for farming of wheat, dairy and fruit.
